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Foreword

There is no denying we have entered a new phase of the climate fight – one defined by a federal administration determined to tether our country to polluting and costly fossil fuels, even as the science demands we transition to clean energy and states like New York move to do so as quickly as possible.

New York continues to make important extraordinary progress. We passed the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act, which six years later remains one of the strongest climate laws in the nation. The rollout of congestion pricing has been a huge unmitigated success. We've begun decarbonizing our buildings and electrifying school buses, boosted funding for environmental protection and water quality, and made big strides in renewable energy.

But progress only matters if we keep moving forward, and the 2025 Legislative Session was New York's first test in this new era.

There were important victories. The FY26 Budget included an historic \$1 billion for climate mitigation projects, including \$200 million for thermal energy networks at SUNY campuses and in communities across the state. Lawmakers reauthorized the State Superfund, increased funding for the EPF to a record \$425 million, amended the mansion tax to exempt land acquired for open space preservation, and funded a record \$68 billion MTA Capital Plan.



In the regular session the State Senate and Assembly repealed the outdated 100-foot rule – a key step in the transition away from fossil fuels that will save ratepayers \$200 million annually – and updated how renewable energy systems are appraised. They also delivered measures to make e-bike and e-scooter batteries safer, enhance the Septic System Replacement Program, and enact a long-overdue ban on PFAS in menstrual products. *All of these bills have been signed into law by Governor Hochul.*

Unfortunately the session will also be remembered for what was not achieved. While the Senate once again passed a Clean Fuel Standard and the Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act, as well as the Find Lead Pipes Faster Act and the Road Salt Task Force bill, these measures never came to a floor vote in the Assembly. And both chambers missed a huge opportunity to boost solar energy production by failing to advance Automatic Solar Permitting.

We cannot allow our progress to slip into fits and starts. Climate change is not waiting. Flash floods drown our roads and subways with alarming regularity, wildfire smoke drifts in from Canada annually, and each year is hotter than the last.

This is about more than setting bold goals and meeting targets. Unless we take real, concrete action, the crisis will only worsen.

The path forward picks up where the Senate and Assembly left off — passing measures that reduce emissions from the transportation sector, get us on

the path to zero waste, continue to decarbonize state facilities, and expand renewable energy and battery storage.

New York must advance toward a clean energy economy wherever and however it can, independent of Washington, while laying the groundwork for when the federal logjam breaks – an outcome we must all work to bring about.

We also need local officials to be partners when it comes to implementation and to lead in educating their communities about the safety and benefits of clean energy technology.

IT'S ALL HANDS ON DECK.

New York has the resources and the responsibility to lead the nation's clean energy transition. But leadership doesn't just happen. That's why we urge New Yorkers to use this scorecard to measure the actions – or inactions – of their representatives.

Only by holding lawmakers accountable can we ensure New York remains at the forefront of the climate fight and continues to set the standard for the nation to follow.

New York State Budget Victories

While we don't assign a score to the State Budget, it delivered significant progress on climate action this year. Most notably, it included a historic \$1 billion investment in climate initiatives, supporting thermal energy networks, electric school buses, renewable energy, and clean energy upgrades for New Yorkers. The budget also included a fully funded MTA Capital Plan and a record-high \$425 million for the Environmental Protection Fund. The continued allocation of \$500 million for the Clean Water Infrastructure Act was a win, but still \$100 million short of what's needed to protect our water systems. We hope New York continues to lead with strong, sustained investments in climate, mass transit, and environmental protection.

BUDGET MEASURES NYLCV SUPPORTED INCLUDED

- **\$1B** for the Sustainable Future Program
 - **\$450M** for building decarbonization projects, including at least \$200 million for thermal energy networks
 - **\$250M** for zero emission transportation, including up to \$100 million for electric school buses and related infrastructure
 - **\$200M** for renewable energy projects
- **\$68B** for the fully funded MTA's Capital Plan
- Increasing the Environmental Protection Fund to \$425 million, getting us closer to the goal of a \$500 million EPF
- Reauthorization of the State Superfund program
- Expansion of the geothermal tax credit
- Exempting land acquired for open space preservation from the mansion tax

We applaud Governor Hochul, Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins, Speaker Heastie, Environmental Conservation Committee Chairs Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Deborah Glick, and Energy Committee Chairs Senator Kevin Parker and Assemblymember Didi Barrett for including these important policies in this year's budget.

About the Bills

REPEAL OF THE 100-FOOT RULE

S. 8417/ A. 8888

This policy would eliminate the “100-foot rule” that requires gas hookups for new residential customers if their building is within 100 feet of an existing gas pipeline. Although it’s marketed as a “free” service, such connections are subsidized by ratepayers across the system in the form of “delivery costs”. By eliminating the 100-foot rule, customers would save over \$200 million annually. *Sponsored by Senator Liz Krueger and Assemblymember Jo Anne Simon. S. 8417/ A. 8888 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on December 19, 2025.*



APPRAISAL OF RENEWABLES

S. 8012 / A. 8332

This legislation would clarify how solar and wind energy systems should be valued and appraised for taxation purposes. Creating a consistent appraisal method for solar and wind energy projects would provide regulatory certainty for renewable energy developers and municipal officials across the state. This is necessary to ensure that New York is well-positioned to grow our renewable energy sector and get back on track to achieve the goals of the CLCPA. *Sponsored by Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Micah Lasher. S. 8012/A. 8332 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on December 3, 2025.*

AUTOMATIC SOLAR PERMITTING

A. 6270-A/S. 5781

This bill would require municipalities with a population of 5,000 or more to implement automatic online permitting for code-compliant permits for residential solar systems and residential energy storage systems paired with solar systems by January 1, 2026. Delays are cited as the top reason for solar project cancellations in the United States. This bill would require free online portals, like the NREL-developed SolarAPP+, to be adopted by municipalities, thus speeding up the solar building process and contributing to solar energy goals. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Brian Cunningham and Senator Peter Harckham. A. 6270-A/S. 5781 died in the Senate Finance Committee and died in Assembly Energy.*



HOME UTILITY WEATHERIZATION JOBS ACT

S. 641-A /A. 3655-A

This legislation would create a statewide program requiring utility companies to update weatherization and insulation in New Yorkers’ homes in order to lower utility bills, protect from severe weather events, and reduce overall energy use. It would mandate each utility in New York to submit a weatherization pilot program that focuses on low- and middle-income households that meet the emission reduction and equity goals in the CLCPA. *Sponsored by Senator Sean Ryan and Assemblymember William Conrad. S. 641-A /A. 3655-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Energy.*

CLEAN FUEL STANDARD

S. 1343-A / A. 472-A

This legislation would create a clean fuel standard to reduce carbon intensity of on-road transportation fuels by at least 20% by 2032 and make further reductions in line with CLCPA goals after 2032. This policy would incentivize fleets and fuel providers to move away from carbon-intensive fuels like diesel and gasoline toward low- or zero-carbon fuels like electric, biofuels, and hydrogen. *Sponsored by Senator Kevin Parker and Assemblymember Carrie Woerner, S. 1343-A / A. 472-A. 1343-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Environmental Conservation.*



E-BIKE BATTERY EPR

S.73-A / A.4641-A

This bill would maximize the removal of unwanted rechargeable batteries from the solid waste stream. Specifically, it would amend the current battery recycling law to include the specific types of lithium-ion rechargeable batteries used in e-bikes and e-scooters. Moreover, it would allow the City of New York to enforce provisions of the rechargeable battery law to address fire risks from improperly used or refurbished batteries. *Sponsored by Senator Brian Kavanagh and Assemblymember Deborah Glick. S. 73/A. 4641 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on December 19, 2025.*

PACKAGING REDUCTION AND RECYCLING INFRASTRUCTURE ACT

S. 1464/ A. 1749

This legislation would require producers of packaging waste to take financial responsibility for the recycling of their products, either by funding existing municipal recycling or by creating new systems. The Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act would shift the burden of recycling products back to the producer, similar to product stewardship programs that are already in use in New York for electronic

waste, paint, pharmaceutical drugs, and carpet. Successful waste reduction programs create financial incentives for producers to minimize the amount of waste they produce in the first place and use more readily recyclable materials in production.

Sponsored by Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Deborah Glick, S. 1464/ A. 1749 passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Ways and Means.



SEPTIC SYSTEM REPLACEMENT FUND

S.8241-A / A.8807

This bill would allow septic systems that significantly reduce nitrogen, phosphorus, or PFOA/PFAS chemicals in treated effluent to be reimbursed at 75% of cost rather than 50% through the State Septic System Replacement Fund. Aging septic systems and cesspools significantly contribute to groundwater contamination, particularly on Long Island, making this legislation instrumental in combating septic and cesspool pollution. *Sponsored by Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Rebecca Kassay. S.8241-A / A.8807 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on July 23, 2025.*

FIND LEAD PIPES FASTER ACT

S. 3581/ A. 2181

This legislation would require water customers or non-owner adult occupants to allow water utilities to visually inspect water service lines to determine if there are lead pipes servicing the building. With a forthcoming U.S. Environmental Protection Agency mandate commencing in 2027 to replace all lead pipes nationwide within a decade, New York's water systems need an accurate inventory as soon as possible – which this bill would help achieve – in order to achieve 100% lead pipe replacement. *Sponsored by Senator Gustavo Rivera and Assemblymember Amy Paulin. S. 3581/ A. 2181 passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Health.*



ROAD SALT REDUCTION TASK FORCE

S. 6976-A/A. 4481-A

This legislation would establish the New York Road Salt Reduction Council and Advisory Committee to continue the work and implement the recommendations of the Adirondack Road Salt Reduction Task Force. Road salt is commonly used to make roads safer to drive on during snowy conditions; however, it can also contaminate drinking water by leaching into groundwater, harming wildlife and rendering water unsafe for human consumption. The Council would assess these impacts and recommend limits and safer alternatives. *Sponsored by Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblymember Billy Jones. S. 6976-A/A. 4481-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Transportation, where it has since had its enacting clause stricken following Assemblymember Jones' resignation.*

PFAS IN MENSTRUAL PRODUCTS

S. 1548/ A. 1502

This legislation would prohibit the use of unsafe substances including PFAS chemicals in menstrual products and authorize the Department of Health to promulgate regulations to prohibit the use of further substances that it determines to be unsafe in menstrual products. *Sponsored by Senator Nathalia Fernandez and Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal. S. 1548/A. 1502 passed in both houses and was signed into law by Governor Hochul on December 19, 2025.*

BEAUTY JUSTICE ACT

S. 2057-A/A. 2054-A

This legislation would provide for the regulation of ingredients in personal care products. Specifically, it would ban the use of certain toxic chemicals in

cosmetic, infant, and beauty products – as consistent exposure can be dangerous for public health and human development – while encouraging the production of safer alternatives. *Sponsored by Senator Lea Webb and Assemblymember Deborah Glick. S. 2057-A/A. 2054-A passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Ways and Means.*



AUTOMATIC VOTER REGISTRATION

S. 88 /A. 6772

This legislation would enhance and clarify automatic voter registration (AVR) procedures in New York State by establishing specific AVR processes for transactions involving the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and Medicaid enrollment while ensuring appropriate safeguards and notification procedures. This would be a vital step toward increasing voter participation and modernizing the electoral process. *Sponsored by Senator Mike Gianaris and Assemblymember Karines Reyes. S. 88 /A. 6772 passed in the Senate and died in Assembly Election Law.*

Methodology & Key Results

Bills that passed their respective houses of the legislature were graded on whether or not each legislator took the pro-environment vote. An unexcused missed vote is counted the same as an anti-environmental vote, though we did not count excused absences against the final score. Scored bills that did not reach a floor vote were graded on co-sponsorship. Annual scores are based on a scale of 0 to 100 and calculated by dividing the number of pro-environmental votes or bill sponsorships by the total number of bills each member was scored on. This year, we are grading 13 bills in the State Senate and 12 bills in the Assembly. Legislative leaders—including *Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins*, *Senate Minority Leader Robert Ort*, *Senate Deputy Majority Leader Michael Gianaris*, *Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie*, *Assembly Majority Leader Crystal Peoples-Stokes*, and *Assembly Minority Leader William A. Barclay*—were not graded, although the scores of their conferences, which they have a substantial impact on, are listed.

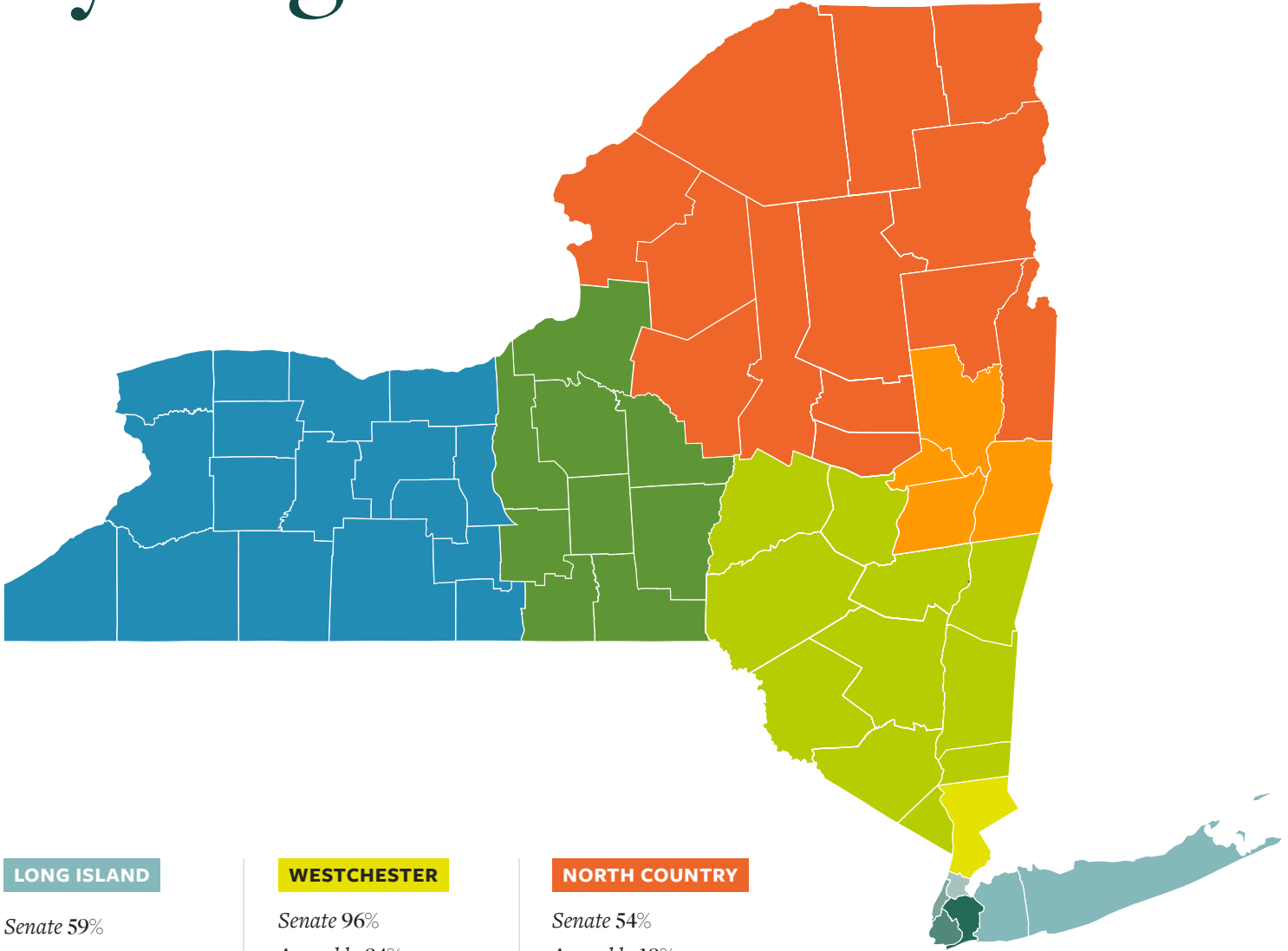

This annual State Legislative Environmental Scorecard is our method for holding representatives accountable. In consultation with our partners from environmental, environmental justice, public health, and transportation groups, we identify for inclusion in our Scorecard the priority bills that have passed the legislature and those which we believe have a chance of becoming law. We then score each senator and assembly member based on their support of these bills.
